



Preparing Your Home and Property





PREPARE YOUR HOME AND

PROPERTY FOR CYCLONE AND FLOODS

Preparing your family and your home for a cyclone is your responsibility. If you live in a cyclone prone area, you must make it a priority to get your home ready inside and out.

Before the cyclone season YOU MUST

- Trim branches and treetops around your home
- Remove or secure loose items around your home
- Fix shutters or metal screens to all your glass windows and doors
- □ Know how to switch off the electricity, gas and water

Ask yourself

- Does your home meet local council cyclone and flood standards?
- Is your home safe to stay in during a cyclone?
- Are the walls, roof, and eaves secure?
- Are your shutters and locks working?
- Does your property insurance cover you for cyclone and flood?

When a BLUE ALERT is issued, you need to start preparing your home for the possible threat of a cyclone. This includes securing all items outside such as your boat, caravan or trailer.



WAYS TO SAVE ENERGY AT HOME






Jeffrey Morgan, RRKAC members and Staff members



RECIPE - Chickpea and Spinach Curry:



Ingredients: -

- 1 can of Chickpeas, rinse and drain thoroughly.
- 4 cups of fresh spinach or a can, drained.
- 14oz or a can of coconut milk.
- 1 tablespoon of olive oil.
- 1 onion, diced.
- 3 cloves of garlic, cut in small pieces or you can use minced garlic too.
- 1 tablespoon of minced ginger, curry powder and cumin.
- Salt and pepper to taste.
- Fresh parsley to garnish.

Instructions: -

- 1. **Saute the Aromatics:** In a large skillet/pan, heat olive oil over medium heat. Add the chopped onion and saute for about 5 minutes until translucent. Stir in the garlic and ginger, cooking for another minute until fragrant.
- 2. Add Spices: Sprinkle in curry powder and cumin, stir to combine and cook for about 30 seconds.
- 3. Add Chickpeas and Coconut Milk: Add chickpeas and coconut milk. Stir well and bring to a simmer. Let it cook for about 5-7 minutes, allowing the flavours to fuse.
- 4. **Add Spinach:** Add spinach and cook until wilted, which should not take longer than 3 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Add freshly chopped parsley for garnish.
- 5. **Serve:** Serve with warm cooked rice I personally prefer to eat with naan bread.

Note: - You can add other vegetables too for extra nutrition and taste.







Online training with Living Languages

From August to September, PKKP members took part in an online training series delivered by Living Languages, designed to build skills essential for language work. Rather than focusing on learning language directly, this training equipped members with practical tools for supporting and preserving language – a big part of making the PKKP language program a success.

The training included three sessions: Session 1 introduced the landscape of Indigenous languages in Australia and the importance of language work, Session 2 covered pronunciation and grammar, focusing on unique sounds in Australian languages, and Session 3 explored setting language goals and creating resources, helping members plan meaningful language projects.

Participants found the sessions engaging and valuable, gaining skills in reading and pronouncing Indigenous language sounds, as well as strategies for language-based project planning. With positive feedback from the training, the PKKP language team is eager to host Living Languages trainers in Karratha for in-person sessions in 2025.



PKKP Language Team Joins PKKP AC at Garma Festival

The PKKP language team had the privilege of attending the Garma Festival as part of the PKKP AC delegation. Held in Arnhem Land, the Garma Festival is a renowned celebration of Yolngu culture, offering a deep insight into the rich traditions and way of life in the region. The event featured vibrant music, traditional ceremonies, dancing, and thought-provoking forums on topics impacting Indigenous communities around the country.

The highlights for the language team were the daily bunggul, ceremonial dance and song performed by the various Yolngu clans; the escarpment walk, facilitated by the Dhimurru Rangers; and the nightly musical performances from artists such as Yirrmal, Jess Hitchcock, King Stingray and a collection of Yolngu artists who performed some of Yothu Yindi's greatest hits.

For PKKP AC members, Garma provided invaluable opportunities to learn from the cultural sharing and generosity of the Yolngu people, sparking inspiration for similar cultural events to be delivered here one day.









Language team on the Pinikura Return to Country trip

In late August, the PKKP language team was honoured to join first Pinikura Return to Country trip at the invitation of the Cultural Advisory Committee. The journey included visits to significant cultural and historical



sites such as Nanutarra Homestead, Dicksons Crossing, Paulsens Mine (including a significant birthplace), Battle Hill and House Creek.

During the trip, the team recorded language, stories, and on-camera interviews with filmmaker Chris Lewis, allowing participants to share knowledge of the land, recount stories of the old people, and reflect on life growing up on country.

As a pioneering event, the trip presented opportunities for learning and refining processes to improve future Return to Country experiences.

The trip underscored the importance of passing knowledge between generations, highlighting the need for continued cultural education and improved access to sites across Pinikura country for future trips.





Language Program give First Presentation as part of the **Australian Languages Workshop**

The PKKP language team recently delivered a presentation to the Australian Languages Workshop in Canberra, titled "Collect, Connect, and Share: Starting an Evidence-Based Language Program at a Native Title Body Corporate." The presentation received positive feedback, with feedback focusing on the process-based, practical approach of PKKP AC's program. Rather than a broad overview, the team shared concrete steps

they've taken to build the language program, explaining both their actions and the reasons behind them. As a new program, we are lucky to have the ability to build our processes from the ground up and learn from the many communities who have taken this journey before PKKP, and this means we have been able to implement evaluation checkpoints to make sure we stay on track.

Notably, Professor Jane Simpson, a prominent figure in Australian linguistics, praised the team's dedication and remarked that their achievements in just 13 months rivalled efforts that have taken a decade in other communities – immense praise that we are very proud of and a testament to the dedication of the team and the PKKP community to strengthen language use and knowledge.



Pinikura Language Group Represents WA at Prestigious Workshop

A delegation of 3 Pinikura members recently achieved an incredible milestone. being selected to participate in the prestigious Paper and Talk Workshop, held from October 14 to 25. Run jointly by the Australian Institute for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) and Living Languages, the workshop brought together representatives from only seven language groups across Australia, including Kabi Kabi, Kukatj, Kunjen, Mithaka,

Gunggay (all Queensland) Yarluyandi (South Australia) and Pinikura. The workshop is targeted at languages with limited documentation (i.e. not many recordings, wordlists, books etc), so while selection is something to celebrate, it also demonstrates the real challenges for those language groups to make their languages strong. Pinikura is the first language group from Western Australia to attend this workshop, and with over 50 language groups across WA, this selection highlights the significant progress made by Pinikura people in the 2 short years of the PKKP languages program.

Representing the Pinikura group at the workshop were Mitchell Drage, Terry Drage, and Chanice Daulbin-Satrick, along with their linguist partner (and PKKP Language Education Consultant) Amy Parncutt. The Paper and Talk Workshop is renowned for fostering skills and knowledge that help support the revitalisation and documentation of Indigenous languages, and the Pinikura representatives immersed themselves in this learning experience, gaining valuable tools and insights to strengthen their language and culture for future generations.

A more in-depth write-up about the workshop and the new skills the participants have acquired will be featured in the newsletter early next year. Stay tuned!!

mine site to accompany a
team of Puutu Kunti Kurrama
members conducting an
archaeological survey. This
marked the second survey
involving language team
members, following a Rio Tinto
survey in April.

The visit was facilitated by
Joan Ashburton, who has been
working with the language
program to support her in
her role at Eliwana. Joan
has been integrating more
Kurrama language into the
survey activities undertaken by
PKKP members, using existing
Kurrama language materials,
such as the Kurrama dictionary,

to help younger survey workers develop their language skills while on Country. Looking ahead to 2025, the language team has been collaborating with the wider Heritage, Culture, and Language Unit to further integrate language into all aspects of on-Country work. This initiative will support PKKP members who are eager to learn their language, especially while out on-Country, as well as Elders and knowledge holders who find it easier to remember and share language whilst back home.

A significant challenge for adult language learners is finding time to study amidst responsibilities like work, family, and childcare. To address this, the language



team is exploring innovative ways to make language learning a seamless part of daily life as a Puutu Kunti Kurrama or Pinikura person. By weaving language into everyday experiences, the team hopes to ensure that learning becomes a natural and accessible process for all PKKP members.



Language Team at the AGM



The language team hosted a table (well, two!) at the PKKP AC AGM again this year. Thanks to all who visited us! We hope you enjoyed the 'waba' (Kurrama) and 'banyu' (Pinikura) (both words meaning 'good') stickers and 'wanthaya' (Pinikura, hello/how are you) and 'mujira' (Kurrama, dingo) magnets we had to share.

Exciting Steps Toward Writing Systems for Kurrama and Pinikura

In November, we were thrilled to host Dr. Doug Marmion in Karratha to begin consultations on developing orthographies—the systems for writing a language down—for both Kurrama and Pinikura languages. Over the

course of two weeks, Doug met with members of both language groups to discuss the importance of designing a writing system and key considerations in making these decisions. It was a great excuse to have a morning

and afternoon tea during the AGM week – and of course that meant johnny cakes and damper!

While both languages have been written in various forms for many years, the way they are written was not decided by Puutu Kunti Kurrama or Pinikura people. Historically, commonly accepted spellings have often come from individuals, including anthropologists, linguists, government employees, or individual members of the language groups and so this consultation offers a rare opportunity for Puutu Kunti Kurrama people to decide how to write Kurrama

language, and Pinikura
people to decide how to
write Pinikura, so that
there is a standard way of
writing sounds and words
in these languages that has
been decided by the people
these languages come
from.

Developing these orthographies is a unique process—most languages worldwide have been written for generations, meaning no one alive remembers how early writing systems were established. For the Kurrama and Pinikura languages, this moment is about reclaiming agency and making decisions that

reflect the identity and voice of the communities. Once finalised, these writing systems will be adopted by the Corporation for all communications, naming, and materials. This standardisation will establish norms that the wider community can follow, fostering consistency and recognition of these languages. It's an exciting opportunity to make decisions that will shape the future of Kurrama and Pinikura languages. We look forward to welcoming Dr. Doug Marmion back to PKKP in 2025 to continue this important work!
